
DISTRICT PROFILE

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ACADEMIC ACHIEVEMENT SUMMARY

Elementary Schools Overview

- ▶ 91.5% 3rd graders reading on grade level
- Math & Reading scores have increased in the last three years
- 97% of classrooms successfully implementing a literacy framework which is leading to growth in literacy scores in all grades
- Increasing use of technology
- All 5th grade students participated in the IB Exhibition

Secondary Schools Overview

- 19 2015 NC graduates accepted into Ivy League Schools
- 81% of the 2015 NC Graduates accepted into post secondary institutions
- Algebra I & English I0 state scores increased in 2015 after being first among the MSDs in 2014
- The % of MS students passing state test increased over last three years in math, English, science, and social studies.
- One MS read more than 10,000 books during the 14-15 school year
- 512 JELCC students earned 3,340 college credits

Summary for Forecasting 2015-2025

- Overcrowding in current facilities continues
- Up to 600 additional students
- Boundary inefficiencies with current feeder system
- Forecast only considered currently open schools
- Next study in progress is on enrollment management with consideration to currently closed schools


